- b) we brought together people and organisations in a way that enabled us to accelerate the whole programme, and share insights through the more intensive use of blogs, and look at innovation in this field <http://www.elrha.org/hif-blog/innovators-protection-endangered-heritage/>
- c) It demonstrated how the use of a Cloud based service could be a tool to facilitate collaboration between international experts and local people, as well as creating a peer to peer network of frontline practitioners.
- d) Was a catalyst for new partnerships (UCL, Bristol University and Northumbria University in the UK, Leiden University in the Netherlands and Rice University in the US) which we were able to include a proposal for follow up funding.
- e) A concept developed for a sustainable and scalable enterprise approach

4. Please describe how the project achieved the planned objectives, and describe all of the results achieved through the activities indicated in Question 1.

The approach is detailed in the work plan as well as the the Logframe.

In addition to a practical demonstration of community based heritage stewardship in an area affected by conflict and environmental challenges, it also highlighted a wide range of other humanitarian applications for this approach from flood risk management, irrigation and food security, forensics and rule of law; infrastructure monitoring and management, documented in a series of blogs and on the Facebook project site.

APPROACH

5. The approach was highly appropriate. The use of a Facebook project page enabled us to reach out to experts around the World, share insights and build a community of interest. <https://www.facebook.com/skyviewsdjenne>

We started out with multiple potential field trial sites for consultations with local partners and then quickly focussed on the most appropriate, where we had the strongest local support for the main field trial which was Mali. <http://elrha.org/hif-blog/choose-mali-site-test-concept>

It also proved to be one of the toughest areas to operate, but that had the benefit of fully testing the approach, and highlighting the value in a real case with high national and international profile.

MAJOR OBSTACLES

6. Please list the three most significant obstacles faced during the project and describe how they affected the planned activities and results.

Obstacle	Impact of Obstacle
1. Engagement and trust of local community recognising degree of insecurity / tensions within the country	Time taken to find the right people on the ground, and that any misunderstanding can lead to suspicion about motives which may not reflect local interests
2. Lack of connectivity	Impact on digital media processing and real time engagement with international experts
3. Building and maintaining momentum recognising we were at the stage of concept development	This was only a concept development phase and thus we needed to manage expectations about our capacity to follow on which is endangering the momentum we have built up

7. Please indicate what steps were taken to address these obstacles and whether the solutions were effective.

Solution	Effective?
1. Training and support of champions within the local community	Very effective, but this takes time and not all selected candidates will have the same degree of aptitude
2. Use of innovations in Wireless networking and connectivity through G3+	Partly solved the problem, but need greater capacity to be fully effective, for example, the use of a satellite link
3. Worked up a follow up proposal after the initial very positive feedback	We are ready to continue and are now waiting to hear from HIF

8. How and why did the partnership change during the course of the project?

The AAAS singled Mali and Syria out as key case studies in the field of conflict and heritage stewardship. We chose to focus on Mali for the field work and shared the rationale for this in the blog: <http://elrha.org/hif-blog/choose-mali-site-test-concept>

The profile we rapidly gained for the project led to many offers of collaboration and advice which we hope to build on in the development phase.

Keen interest from the Malian Government led to meetings with the Ministers of Culture and of Tourism, the Director of the Mission Culturelle and Head of the National Museum as well as support from both the British and Swedish Ambassadors, and UNESCO in-country representative. The wider significance of this approach to stabilisation was documented in an endorsement from the British Ambassador in Mali.
